FAKE IRAQ at Angels Gate

The exhibition *Welcome to Fake Iraq*, on view at Angels Gate Cultural Center through October 25, is a strange hall of mirrors. As the title suggests, the theme of the show deals with America's involvement in the war—specifically, the largely unseen/unknown training exercises that take place at something called the National Training Center, a bustling, 1,000 square-mile high desert Army installation near Barstow, CA. Eight CalArts grad students visited the NTC under the rubric of "embedded journalist" in order to train, participate, observe, and then realize some art ideas for this show. The results here at the gallery are splinters, not terribly sharp, that reflect the different faces of a fictional reality constructed by the military and deconstructed by artists.

The military knew these eight artists were artists, and not journalists looking for actual combat training. The Army quite simply didn't seem to mind. Since January 2008, the NTC has been casting for warm bodies (reporters and otherwise) that can stand in as "embedded journalists", in a coded sort of "we have nothing to hide" gesture. High-browed L.A.-based art students seem to be worth just as much to the Army as the more applicable journalism student, or actual news reporter, when it comes to facilitating the charade of war. Maybe the Army figured that art posed no risk to the operation? Or maybe the military brass reckoned that allowing

artists into the fold for a few days might help to further the PR task of "putting a face on things," thus further bolstering the credibility and professionalism of America's fighting men and women to the extent that public opinion would swing firmly back in favor of the war(s)?

Artist Danielle Adair, one of the more intrepid of the eight, got so much out of her experience at NTC that she sought out and received actual media sponsorship to travel to Afghanistan to be actually embedded with a fighting unit. To this end Adair's video, *The Making of Americans*, fails to demonstrate any clear epiphany about the necessity of war and the imperative to gather first-hand images about it. If anything, her pairing of Gertrude Stein's reading of her famous novel (*The Making of Americans*) with amateurish video footage of an instructor lecturing to participants "in the field" actually sabotages the American moral certitude that engenders troop deployment in the first place. Or so this reviewer thought.

Of the other seven artists in the show, Jason Kunke comes the closest in terms of presenting a very simple, unclouded form that speaks volumes about why wars happen in the first place. In the center of the first gallery, Kunke has constructed a scale model—about 18 feet long here—of a Nike surface-to-air missile out of corrugated plastic and wood. It's just pretend, like the NTC and the artists here who impersonated journalists. But below the hobby-shop artifice of *Model Bunker*, 1:2.5 Scale lurks the ugly truth of our killing imperative: our capacity to operate as fetishists while cruising the most vulgar shops of horror.
